



Risks

• Procurement Challenge

- The proposed variations to the MRMC would be in accordance with the PCR 2015
- We can provide evidence that modifications to the existing contract has become necessary, economically and technically justifiable and amount to less than 50% of original value
- significant benefits operationally for Biffa to undertake the work on our behalf
- General Supply Chain Costs
 - RDF cost will track EfW price -
- Delay to government guidance and commitment by Ds&Bs
 - review in 2 years if uncertainty persists
- Further policies re. waste and decarbonisation likely within the next 10 years
 - Retention of MBT facility would be prudent



Recommended that Cabinet approve:

(1) The variation of the Materials Resource Management Contract and associated capital investment to allow for:

- a. processing of source-segregated food waste
- b. production of loose RDF
- c. improvements for the capture, storage, and disposal of metal for recycling to achieve the income from metals
- d. removal of redundant equipment
- e. bulking of dry mixed recycling (DMR) for delivery to the materials recycling facility (MRF)

(2) The commencement of a procurement for the disposal of refuse derived fuel until 2035 with a possible extension until 2040

(3) Delegation of authority to commence (1) and (2) above to the Director of Environment and Public Protection at a time to be agreed in consultation with the Cabinet Member for Environment and Climate Change and the Directors of Finance and Legal Services. In the event that either or both (1) and (2) are not exercised prior to 31st March 2024, to bring a further report to Cabinet no later than 30th June 2024

Public Consultation

- Open 10th November to 21st December 2021 and received 7,374 responses
- 71% (5196) have used the booking system, [™]_{29%} (2128) had not.
- 98% had booked online, 2% via telephone.
- Of the 2128 who had not used the system:
 - 85% didn't need to visit
 - 5% could not find a slot to suit
 - 10% other
- In terms of making a booking:
 - 83% (4429) said extremely/quite easy
 - 9% (497) said neither easy or difficult
 - 6% (304) said quite/extremely difficult
 - 3% didn't know.
- 62% (3863) strongly agreed/agreed that the book system should be maintained
- 38% (2382) disagreed or strongly disagreed.

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

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

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Faster Delivery – emerging recommendations (1)

- Schemes requested by Communities to be defined as 'simple' or 'complex'.
- Complex schemes will take two years to complete but simple schemes can be delivered in one year.
- Simple schemes will have to meet a key set of criteria.
 For example:
 - Land in WSCC ownership/full control
 - Cost of scheme <£25,000</p>
 - No requirement for a Road Safety Audit
 - Are not part of a wider programme of works



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

The Fire and Rescue National Framework for England (2018) requires all Fire and Rescue Authorities to produce an Integrated Risk Management Plan (IRMP) that covers at least a 3-year period. We are now in the fourth and final year of our existing 2018-2022 IRMP and have developed a new Community Risk Management Plan (CRMP) covering 2022-2026 [per guidance from the National Fire Chiefs Council (NFCC), there has been a change in terminology from IRMP to CRMP].

During the planning process, we consider our community risks, using a range of sophisticated analytical tools to identify where incidents might happen, when they might occur and how serious they could be. Using this data alongside historical information about demand allows us to identify options to better target our resources, including firefighters and appliances, more effectively, resulting in a better balance of prevention, protection and response activities. This plan then clearly communicates this to the public, reinforcing the services commitment to our communities.

National Highways Consultation A27 Arundel Bypass: Approval of WSCC Consultation Response

The A27 Arundel Bypass has been included in the Government's Roads Investment Strategy (2020-25). In 2020, National Highways (formerly Highways England) announced the preferred route for the A27 Arundel Bypass, which will replace the existing single carriageway road with a dual carriageway bypass. The proposed bypass will feature approximately 8km of dual carriageway to the south of the existing A27.

The proposal, the A27 Arundel Bypass, is a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project requiring a Development Consent Order (DCO) from the Secretary of State (rather than planning permission from the local planning authority). The County Council is a statutory consultee in the DCO process.

Formal consultation on the proposal is taking place from 11 January to 8 March 2022.

The Cabinet will be recommended to approve the County Council's response to the formal consultation on 15 March 2022 (as agreed with National Highways).

Extension of Refuse Derived Fuel Contract

In February 2017, the Cabinet Member for Finance (on behalf of the Cabinet Member for Residents' Services) delegated authority to the Executive Director of Economy, Infrastructure and Environment to award the Refuse Derived Fuel (RDF) Contract. <u>Decision RS14(16/7)</u>.

The RDF Contract was procured with an initial contract term of five years with an option to extend the RDF Contract in minimum increments of whole calendar years, for up to a further five calendar years.

Revisions to the Halewick Lane Battery Storage Project

The Halewick Lane Battery Storage project proposes the re-development of the previously derelict North Sompting Waste Management Site into an income generating battery storage project.

Following a review of the proposed project previously approved by the Cabinet Member for Environment and Climate Change (decision ENV06 (20/21) refers) it has been determined that revisions to the scheme by using a first-life battery option would generate increased revenue from the project.

The Cabinet Member for Environment and Climate Change will therefore be asked to approve the changes to the Halewick Lane Battery Storage Project and the Halewick Lane site with focus on the following key items:

- (1) The change to the previous system design to the purchasing of a first-life utility-scale battery system.
- (2) The proposal to maximise the available export capacity from the site by increasing the battery size to 24 MW.

- (3) The increase in capital expenditure allocated to the project to complete the site in a single phase.
- (4) The launch of a procurement for the revised scheme and delegation of authority to the Director of Environment and Public Protection, at the conclusion of the procurement process, to award the design and build contract for the scheme.
