#### 11. Welcome and introductions

- 11.1 The Chairman welcomed everyone to the meeting. Members and Officers introduced themselves.
- 11.2 The Chairman thanked the officers from the Horsham Growth Team, Your Energy Sussex, and Kinder Living who had provided information prior to the meeting.

#### 12. **Declarations of Interest**

12.1 None declared.

#### 13. Minutes

13.1 RESOLVED – that the minutes of the North Horsham County Local Committee meeting held on 25 June 2018 be approved as a correct record and be signed by the Chairman.

### 14. Urgent Matters

14.1 None.

# 15. **Progress Statement**

- 15.1 Members considered the statements on matters arising from previous meetings (copy appended to the signed minutes) and made the following comments:
  - Regarding parking and the entrance at Horsham hospital, it was confirmed that a trial on switching the entrance and exit had taken place and was being evaluated. It was also confirmed by Denne Neighbourhood Council that a meeting was due to take place to discuss the issues further with Ben Golds at Horsham District Council. It was agreed this would be kept on the progress statement for updates to be provided.

- Regarding the North of Horsham development, the Chairman confirmed that the developer, Liberty, had not sought consent to start works. The Chairman had received assurances from officers that the local members would be informed when the request was received.
- Mr Baldwin stated that discussions were continuing around the cycling and walking strategy and a meeting was scheduled for before Christmas. The County and District Councils were taking forward the issue of signage in West Street.
- The Area Highways Manager reported that works to improve signage were in progress following some delays. He undertook to keep members informed.
- Mr Baldwin stated that a Speed Indictor Device was being borrowed from Mid Sussex but that he was also working with Resident Associations and Neighbourhood Councils to put a Crowdfunding project together to purchase one for North Horsham.
- The Chairman reported that he attended a CLC Chairman's meeting today and Road Space Audits were discussed. As the progress statement mentions a Cabinet Member decision was expected in December and Horsham was expected to be identified as one of the key areas for progression.

## 16. Talk With Us Open Forum

- 16.1 The Chairman invited questions from those in attendance. The following maters were discussed:
  - Mr Gooderham asked why the Community Highway Scheme for a zebra crossing in Station Road, Billingshurst had been rejected and why the estimated cost was so high. The Area Highways Manager responded firstly stating that the cost was probably over estimated but would include design costs, removal and/or relocation of existing markings, traffic management during the works and any drainage requirements. He added that with regard to this request concern was raised about forward visibility of queueing traffic when approaching from the south-east, proximity of the Carpenters junction, the impact on the school keep clear markings, the impact of the zig zag markings on the school bus layby and the impact on the bus stop on the north side of the road. He added that at present children have a modicum of safety crossing the road due to the presence of a School Crossing Patrol (SCP), but if a zebra crossing was installed then they would be doing so at their own risk on the assumption that the SCP would no longer be necessary at this location. For the County Council to make changes to the highway infrastructure they have to be certain that they are not compromising safety or generating hazards that currently do not exist. The Area Highways Manager also stated that in relation to this application there were issues identified that affected its potential deliverability, and as a result it failed to meet the minimum requirements for progression at this time. The Area Highways Manager added that this does not mean that a future application will also be rejected; however we would expect any future application to address the issues identified and the Area

- Highways Manager would be happy to work with the applicant or Parish Council to see how these issues might be mitigated.
- Mr Garley from Colgate Parish Council spoke in relation to the Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) request to reduce the speed limit on Forest Road. He asked if the CLC could agree to extend the TRO further along the road to Colgate. The Area Highways Manager explained that only the western end of the road met the speed limit policy for a 40mph and that the CLC did not have the power to go against policy. It was suggested that the other areas could fit policy for 50mph but Mr Garley explained that the speedwatch group could not monitor roads with speed limits over 40mph.
- Members of the Horsham Society circulated copies of their new publication 'Good by Design' to Members. They explained that the documents aim was to promote higher standards of building design. The asked if they could meet the design team for the Horsham Enterprise Park. The Chairman responded thanking them for the document and added that in the first instance he would encourage them to respond to the current consultation on the masterplan for the site. The consultation was open until 16 November. The Chairman also agreed to pass on their details to the design team.
- A local resident, Mr Lusher, handed Members a copy of a map showing the Horsham Enterprise Park site and highlighted an alternative road system and entrance to the proposed residential part of the site. He stated that many residents feel that the access from Wimblehurst Road is too close to the roundabout and it was suggested that an entrance on Parsonage Road be considered. Mr Lusher asked the CLC to support his alternative option. The Chairman responded stating that he understood that the residents groups would be feeding this suggestion in via the formal consultation and it would therefore be considered by the design team. Mr Baldwin stated that although he supported the suggestion he still felt that traffic lights were needed at the junction on to existing mini roundabout on Wimblehurst Road.
- Residents from Five Oaks raised a number of issues about pavements and road safety in Five Oaks. It was suggested they apply for a Community Highway Scheme with the Parish Council for a speed reduction scheme. Both the Area Highways Manager and Amanda Jupp, the local Member, agreed to work with the residents and Parish Council to look into options. Mrs Jupp also agreed to meet the residents and work with them and the Parish Council to look at the pavement issues and overgrown vegetation.
- A resident of Christ Hospital asked why West Sussex County Council Highways had not objected to a planning application for an extension to a sports centre that would have a significant increase in traffic. Nigel Jupp as the local Member said he had meet local residents about this and understood the data was being questioned. He undertook to discuss this further with the Strategic Planning Team and go back to the residents.
- A resident asked if TROs could be privately funded. The Area Highways Manager confirmed that yes they could be but any scheme would need to meet policy.
- Ruth Fletcher from Horsham Cycling Forum questioned that the Horsham Enterprise Park proposals did not meet standards from the Design Manual for Roads and Bridges. The Chairman suggested she

respond via the consultation but asked if she copies him in he would follow up any issues with the team at County Hall if needed.

# 17. North Horsham Community Initiative Funding (NH03(18/19))

17.1 The Committee considered a report by the Director of Law and Assurance (copy appended to the signed minutes) which detailed applications for Community Initiative Funding. The Committee debated the respective merits of the project for which funding was sought.

#### 17.2 Resolved that:

The following awards be made:

- 245/NH Happy Accidents CIC, Horsham Children's Parade 2019, £3,500 Towards the cost of delivering creative workshops for participating schools in celebration of Horsham District Year of Culture 2019.
- 276/NH Ten little toes baby bank, £750.00 Towards purchasing non-recyclable items for families in need such as cot mattresses and baby bottles.
- 265/NH Broadbridge Heath Cricket Club, Fund outfield ride-on mower, £1,000 Towards purchasing a second-hand ride-on mower to prepare the outfield without using an external contractor.

- 18.3 The Area Highways Manager also updated Members on the previously approved TROs that were detailed in Appendix B

# 19. Community Highway Schemes

19.1 The Area Highways Manager introduced the information report that provided updates on Community Highways Schemes. It was noted that unfortunately none of the new requests from the North Horsham area had been approved for progression. The Area Highways Manager confirmed that all schemes are scored using the same criteria and then go through a moderation panel. He also suggested that some applications did not include enough detail and he did offer to work with applicants to revise schemes.

19.2 The Committee resolved to write to the Cabinet Member for Highways and Transport to express their disappointment that none of the North Horsham schemes had been approved. They would also include in that correspondence that perhaps the scoring system needed to be explained or the score shown in these updates to the CLCs.

Dear Peter,

Thank you for your letter dated 30<sup>th</sup> November regarding the Community Highway Scheme submissions in the North Horsham CLC area.

It is unfortunate that all the applications received for your CLC area did not meet the criteria for progression, which I can assure you is being consistently applied across the county through the respective Area Highway Managers and independent moderation team. It is important that we have criteria that applies to all applications so we can ensure that schemes submitted are feasible, offer wider community benefit and meet our priorities in the West Sussex Plan.

I am pleased to learn that the Area Highway Manager has agreed to meet with scheme applicants to advise on their submissions and make revisions as appropriate, but regretfully I cannot withhold finalising the Annual Delivery Programme for 2019/20 whilst this is undertaken. I understand there are quite a number of applications and it is likely to take the Area Highways Manager several months to work through all the schemes with all the applicants, commensurate with his other duties, and we do need to proceed with the schemes that did meet the threshold criteria. Of course any schemes that are revised and likely to meet the criteria can be resubmitted for consideration for the following financial year.

In relation to quality of submissions and information to applicants, work is being undertaken to provide better advice through the web pages so that future applicants are better informed about what types of schemes are likely to be successful and what we are unlikely to approve. The application form and process are also being reviewed to identify potential improvements and make it easier for applicants to complete. This work is in progress at the present time and should be completed in the new year. At any time the Area Highway Manager would be happy to advise potential applicants on their submissions, however this will not necessarily guarantee the scheme will still meet the relevant criteria.

With regard to the points scoring, this information is freely available from the Area Highway Manager and he will discuss applications with individual Members on an as needs basis to better understand how this score was reached. I do acknowledge your comment about sharing the information in the report to CLCs and will ask the Highways Team to address this for next year.

# Summary

The proposal relates to Christs Hospital Road, Station Road, King Edward Road, Bluecoat Pond and Barnes Wallis Avenue. At their meeting on 7 March 2016 North Horsham County Local Committee (CLC) resolved to promote the installation of double yellow lines on Christs Hospital Road, The Avenue, Station Road and King Edward Road, with two short stretches of single yellow line on Christs Hospital Road, either side of the access to Bluecoat Pond. The original proposal also included single yellow lines throughout Bluecoat Pond and Barnes Wallis Avenue.

As a result of objections received during the public consultation period between 4 October and 25 October 2018, the proposal for a single yellow line throughout Bluecoat Pond and Barnes Wallis Avenue has been omitted from the final proposal.

#### Recommendation

That the North Horsham CLC considers the objections to the scheme, and the responses in Appendix B, and authorises the Director of Law and Assurance to implement the remainder of the proposal for double yellow lines on Christs Hospital Road, The Avenue, Station Road and King Edward Road, including the two short stretches of single yellow line on Christs Hospital Road, as per plans shown in Appendix A.

#### **Proposal**

# 1. Background and Context

- 1.1 At present there are no parking restrictions throughout the area subject to the proposal.
- 1.2 Christs Hospital Railway Station, located at the northern extent of Station Road and 120m north of the area subject to the proposal, is a busy station often used by commuters travelling to Horsham and London. There is a payand-display car park at the station with a capacity of 63 spaces.
- 1.3 Christs Hospital School is also located within the village, attracting large numbers of visitors for events, and in the grounds of the school there is also a Sports and Leisure Centre which is open to the public. There are currently

- plans to expand this Leisure Centre to include an athletics track and other sports facilities. The plans for this expansion include a new 272-space car park.
- 1.4 The principal roads affected by the proposal are Christs Hospital Road and King Edward Road, both of which are street-lit roads that are subject to a 30mph speed restriction. There are two build-out features on Christs Hospital Road, close to its junction with Bluecoat Pond, where priority is given at the eastern build-out to eastbound traffic, and to westbound traffic at the western build-out.
- 1.5 The area subject to the proposal is on a bus route, with a bus stop located on the western build-out feature on Christs Hospital Road, and two bus stops located on King Edward Road.
- 1.6 It has been observed that there is a significant amount of on-street parking around Christs Hospital Road, The Avenue, Station Road and King Edward Road. This parking has been observed to be at least in part the result of an overflow of vehicles from the car park at the railway station.
- 1.7 Drivers have traditionally parked their cars in a sensible manner in this area, however more recently it has been observed that the density of on-street parking has led to some vehicles causing an obstruction to traffic flow.
- 1.8 Given that the proposal is for double yellow lines along Christs Hospital Road, Station Road and King Edward Road, it was anticipated that there would be some parking displacement as a result. In particular, it was deemed likely that there would be a noticeable increase in commuter parking on Bluecoat Pond and Barnes Wallis Avenue. With this in mind it was proposed that these roads should be subject to a single yellow line restriction, No Waiting Mon-Sat, 10-11am, in order to allow for resident parking whilst deterring commuter parking. However this part of the proposal has now been omitted as a result of objections received in the public consultation period, with the agreement of the local member.
- 1.9 The proposal as originally advertised can be viewed on plans shown in Appendix C.

#### 2. Proposal

- 2.1 The proposal is to install 700m of double yellow lines on both sides of Christ Hospital Road (1400m in total), 24m of double yellow lines at the junction of King Edward Road and Station Road and 20m of double yellow lines on both sides of The Avenue (40m in total), as shown in Appendix A.
- 2.2 It is also proposed to install single yellow lines, with a no waiting restriction that applies Monday to Saturday, 10am 11am, along two stretches of Christs Hospital Road either side of the access to Bluecoat Pond, as shown in Appendix A.

#### 3. Resources

3.1 It is estimated that the cost of introducing the proposal will be approximately £2,920. The proposals are an identified North Horsham CLC priority and they pre-date the 2016 TRO process changes. If the Traffic Regulation Order is implemented, the cost will be funded from the approved Highways and Transport Integrated Forward Works Annual Delivery Programme 2018/19 decision ref HI30(17/18) in the Capital Programme 2018/19 – 2022/23.

## Factors taken into account

#### 4. Consultation

- 4.1 The 21-day Statutory Public Consultation period was between 4 October and 25 October 2018. Between these dates copies of the drawings and Statements of reasons were placed at the local library, on the County Council website and Notices were placed on Christs Hospital Road and on Bluecoat Pond.
- 4.2 The Local Member Mr Nigel Jupp was consulted, as was Sussex Police, who registered that they had no objection to the proposals.
- 4.3 During the consultation period 11 objections were received, along with 14 expressions of support for the scheme. Of the 11 objections received, 9 were concerned specifically with the measures proposed for Bluecoat Pond and Barnes Wallis Avenue. It was therefore considered that there was not clear community support for this aspect of the proposal and it has as a result been omitted from the final proposal. See appendix B for a summary of these objections.
- 4.4 The decision to remove the proposed parking restrictions in Bluecoat Pond and Barnes Wallis Avenue was taken after discussion with the local member, Nigel Jupp.

# 5. Risk Management Implications

- 5.1 If the TRO is introduced without the parking restrictions on Bluecoat Pond and Barnes Wallis Avenue, as per the original proposals, there is a risk that a significant amount of commuter parking will be displaced onto Bluecoat Pond and Barnes Wallis Avenue.
- 5.2 If the TRO is not introduced there is a risk that the safety concerns regarding obstructive parking in the area will continue.

#### 6. Other Options considered

6.1 For this scheme a fuller extent to the proposals was considered, to include a single yellow line restriction on Bluecoat Pond and Barnes Wallis Avenue. This was rejected in light of the number of objections received from residents on the two roads where the single yellow line restriction was proposed.

# 7. Equality Duty

- 7.1 The Equality Act 2010 bans unfair treatment and seeks equal opportunities in the workplace and in wider society. It also imposes a Public Sector Equality Duty. The protected characteristics are age, disability, gender reassignment, marriage/civil partnership, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex and sexual orientation.
- 7.2 The protected characteristics have been duly considered and assessed in the course of the consideration of this proposal. No relevant or disproportionate impact upon any of the protected characteristics in the Equality Act 2010 has been identified in the consideration of the proposals detailed in this Report.

#### 8. Social Value

8.1 The introduction of parking restrictions along this area of the network is considered to meet with the County Council's Social Value Policy in that it delivers a safer environment for users of the public highway.

# 9. Crime and Disorder Act Implications

9.1 Although Sussex Police expressed no desire to object to the proposal, they did express the concern that the parking restrictions would migrate the current issue with on-street parking onto other roads in the area, which could in turn generate Crime and Disorder Act issues. The County Council believes that this concern does not negate the requirement to act on the safety issues already present in the area.

# 10. Human Rights

10.1 It is unlawful for a public authority to act in a way that is incompatible with a convention right. There are no concerns regarding any human rights implications in the scheme.

The idea however of a 1 hour restriction in Bluecoat Pond and Barnes Wallis Avenue is much more controversial and is not an issue of safety. It is also not really driven by the above proposal to Christs Hospital Road. The extra cars coming into Bluecoat and BWA will come because the parking down Station Road will be stopped and the current free car park will be removed. There is no good solution to this, although they are supportive of not having the roads completely blocked by commuter parking almost every house only has one allocated parking space and it is commonplace that households have 2 cars. Therefore there will be residents unfairly penalised by this considering they bought their house on a public road with unrestricted parking.

### Resident of Worthing Road

It is a weak argument that there is a traffic hazard due to reduced visibility. Vehicles travelling from itchingfield have a clear and unobstructed view of the restriction and priority before entering it. Asks for figures of RTAs that have occurred.

The Council has put double yellow lines all the way to the station, allowed thousands of new homes and then not given anywhere to park to use the station. The current car park is temporary as you have authorised building on it

It has been observed that the density of on-street parking in the Christs Hospital Road area has on occasion led to vehicles resorting to obstructive parking.

In the last three years there have been no road traffic collisions related to parking in the area. However this is not the only criteria by which TRO proposals are scored by.

The development of new homes in the area has been subject to the usual planning constraints and is unrelated to this proposal.

#### Objector

Objects to this proposal as believe it creates greater risks than the current position.

Does not object to the section between the width restrictions, indeed, nor to the section on Christ's Hospital Road between the Station Road and King Edward Road.

However, the other sections create greater risk for both pedestrians and motorists. Motorist will simply park on the railway bridge and backwards towards Westons Farm along Christ's Hospital Road and walk to the station. There is no footpath and no street lighting and the National Speed Limit applies. Alternatively, at the other end, there is a footpath with no street lighting; however parked vehicles, where the national speed limit applies and the road is of limited width already, will cause traffic issues especially, given the unlawful new entrance on Christ's Hospital Road for CH School. They can find no planning application for the new entrance or

In designing this scheme, it was deemed highly unlikely that motorists would choose to park on the railway bridge, and that if they did they would anyway be subject to local enforcement under the Highway Code, clause 243, which states that motorists should not park on or near the brow of a hill or hump bridge.

It is accepted that some displacement will occur as a result of the proposals, and that where restrictions are being applied in an area subject to commuter parking, this is to some extent unavoidable. However it is also expected that the further away from the train station the unrestricted area is, the less of a safety issue the displaced parking will present.

any consent by WSCC for an easement across the WSCC verge and lowering of the footpath to create an entrance.

This is not a solution to parking issues arising from use of the station. The station parking is inadequate and too expensive. Network Rail should be compelled to fix the problem. 

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

# **Proposal**

# 1. Background and Context

The Community Initiative Fund (CIF) is a County Local Committee (CLC) administered fund that provides assistance to local community projects. Bids should show evidence of projects which can demonstrate community backing, make a positive impact on people's wellbeing and support <a href="https://example.com/The-West Sussex">The West Sussex</a> <a href="https://example.com/Plan">Plan</a>.

The terms and conditions, eligibility criteria and overall aim of the CIF have been agreed by all CLC Chairmen and these can be found on the County Local Committee pages of the West Sussex County Council website using the following link

http://www.westsussex.gov.uk/your\_council/meetings\_and\_decision-making/county\_local\_committees/community\_initiative\_funding.aspx

For projects to be considered for funding they must upload their project idea to the West Sussex Crowd (<a href="www.westsussexcrowd.org.uk">www.westsussexcrowd.org.uk</a>) funding platform and pitch to the Community Initiative fund.

## 2. Proposal

That the Committee considers the pitches to the Community Initiative Funding as set out in Appendix A.

Pledges can be considered in the preparation and fundraising stage. When considering pitches in the preparation stage, decisions are subject to the applicant receiving full verification from locality and starting fundraising by the end of the financial year.

## 3. Resources

For the 2018/19 financial year, North Horsham CLC had a total of £37,714.74, of this £31,587.74 is still available for allocation. Details of awards made in the current program and previous financial year are included in Appendix B.

There are two pitches for consideration by the Committee.

One pitch is in fundraising stage with a total project cost of £16,898.00. One pitch is in fundraising stage with a total project cost of £3,676.00.

These are outlined in Appendix A and can also be viewed at: www.westsussexcrowd.org.uk

CIF is intended for applications up to £5,000.

#### Factors taken into account

#### 4. Consultation

Before a project can be added to the West Sussex Crowd it must be eligible for the <u>Spacehive</u> platform, and then before beginning crowd funding must be verified by <u>Locality</u>. This involves inspecting the project to make sure it's viable and legitimate. The Democratic Services Officer, in consultation with the local County Councillor, will preview all projects that have then gone on to pitch to the Community Initiative Fund to ensure they meet the criteria.

District and Borough Council colleagues are consulted on whether applicants have applied to any funds they administer. In addition, some CLCs have CIF Sub Groups that preview pitches and make recommendations to the CLC.

#### 5. Risk Management Implications

There is a risk in allocating any funding that the applicant will not spend some or all of it or that it might be spent inappropriately. Therefore the terms and conditions associated with CIF provide for the County Council to request the return of funds.

Projects that do not reach 95% of their funding target on The West Sussex Crowd within their project timescales, will not receive any funds. Any pledges made to unsuccessful projects will therefore be returned to the CLC CIF allocation and be detailed in Appendix B.

#### 6. Other Options Considered

The Committee do have the option to defer or decline pitches but must give valid reasons for doing so. If they defer a project they need to take into account the timescales for the project and whether a deferral would allow the CLC to pitch at the following meeting.

# 7. Equality Duty

Democratic Services Officers consider the outcome intentions for each pitch. It is considered that for the following pitches, the intended outcomes would:

- advance equality of opportunity between people who share a protected characteristic and people who do not share it; and
- foster good relations between people who share a protected characteristic and people who do not share it.

The CLC in considering any pitch should be alert to the need to consider any equality implications arising from the bid or the way the money is to be used if any are indicated in the information provided.

#### 8. Social Value

The Community Initiative Fund's eligibility criteria requires applicants to explain how their project will support one or more of the County Council's priorities as set out in <a href="https://example.com/html/>
The West Sussex Plan">https://example.com/html/>
The West Sussex Plan</a>.

#### 9. Crime and Disorder Act Implications

The applications for decision contain projects that will positively benefit the community and contribute toward the County Council's obligations to reduce crime and disorder and promote public safety in section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998.

# 10. Human Rights Act Implications

The County Council's positive obligations under the Human Rights Act have been considered in the preparation of these recommendations but none of significance emerges.
