West Sussex County Council uses pedestrian and vehicle data from potential crossing locations to calculate how difficult is for pedestrians to cross during gaps within the traffic. We use a nationally recognised formula and method that weights factors such as children, disabilities, and history of pedestrian casualties. The data from the busiest 4-hour period is used to calculate a score (a PV2 score) for a location and these scores are used to decide where crossings should be installed.

The reason we use a PV2 calculation to assess new crossing requests is to ensure a consistent and fair approach is applied across the County when justifying and prioritising the installation of new equipment on the highway. The cost of this equipment is expensive, approximately £100,000 k for a standard new crossing, with maintenance charges of approximately £1500 per year, plus equipment replacement at the end of its lifetime (typically 15-20 years depending on location). The County Council must make sure any crossings put in will be well used as the budget available to install and maintain them is limited.

West Sussex County Council Policy states a minimum score of 0.7 is required to justify the installation of new controlled crossing facilities.
