This is due to a change in national chlamydia screening focus, data reporting and targets, the national indicator in the Sexual and Reproductive Health Profiles, Office for Health Improvement and Disparities (OHID) dataset is now focused on the proportion of females screened, rather than all persons. The rationale for the national change in focus is that the harmful effects of chlamydia occur predominantly in women and other people with a womb or ovaries. This indicates that West Sussex (16.8%) is significantly below the national average (20.4%) and broadly in line with Hampshire (16.1%), the lowest within the Council's neighbouring local authorities.</p> <p>It remains a priority to increase chlamydia testing opportunities and awareness across the county. The latest diagnostic data for these sexually transmitted infections (STIs) are shown below. They indicate that the gonorrhoea diagnoses among those accessing sexual health services in West Sussex (77 per 100,000) is significantly below the national average (149 per 100,000), although slightly above neighbouring local authorities (Hampshire, East Sussex, Surrey), with the rate in Brighton and Hove</p> | |

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| | | | | | <p>nearly twice the national average.</p> <p>With regards to syphilis prevalence in the county (7.5 per 100,000), the data indicates that syphilis diagnoses among those accessing sexual health services in West Sussex is significantly below the national average (16.7 per 100,000), above East Sussex (4.2 per 100,000), and broadly in line with Hampshire (7.3 per 100,000) and Surrey (8.9 per 100,000).
